Your Right to Know Disclosure

This report provides an overview of full-time, first-time students who entered BCCC in Fall 2013 and their outcomes for completion, transfer and ongoing enrollment. It fulfills, in part, requirements of the Student-Right-To-Know Act and the Higher Education Opportunity Act.

1. Graduation and Transfer-Out Rates

Graduation and Transfer-Out rates reflect the status of students who enrolled in fall 2013 and for whom 150% of the normal time-to-completion has elapsed.

During the fall semester of 2013, 449 first-time full-time students entered Baltimore City Community College seeking a certificate or degree from BCCC. By August 31, 2016 (for Associate Degrees) or December 31, 2014 (for Certificates), the outcomes were as follows:

- * 47 (10%) of these students had completed their BCCC programs.
- * 37 (8%) last attended a 4-year higher education institution without graduating from BCCC
- * 65 (14%) were still enrolled at BCCC
- * 29 (6%) had transferred out to other 2-year institutions without graduating from BCCC.

Not every student who enters full-time can continue studying full-time over the subsequent semesters because of household and employment obligations. Many students first need 0-credit developmental courses in order to succeed at the college level. Note that in addition to the 53 completers, there were another 39 who transferred out to 4-year institutions without graduating from BCCC and another 63 who were still enrolled at BCCC pursuing their programs at the end of the timeframes indicated. These categories accounted for 35 percent of the entering cohort. Another 7 percent had transferred to another two-year college without graduating from BCCC.

2. Retention Rates

During the fall semester of 2014, 420 students entered Baltimore City Community College as full-time students for the first time and were seeking a degree or certificate. They had never attended another postsecondary institution. By August 31, 2016:

* 18 (4%) had graduated from BCCC.

* 25 (6%) had transferred to 4-year institutions without graduating from BCCC.

* 95 (23%) were still enrolled at BCCC.

* 28 (7%) had transferred to another 2-year institutions without graduating from BCCC.

3. Employment Rates

Through data sharing arrangements with the Maryland State Department of Education, Maryland Higher Education Commission, and Department of Labor,

Licensing, and Regulation, BCCC graduates' employment data are collected and reported annually for most occupational programs via the Perkins Program Quality Index (PQI). Records for graduates of the selected programs are compared with payroll records to determine how many are employed in any field, whether full-time or part-time. For FY 2015, the PQI reported that 73% of BCCC's FY 2014 graduates from the programs shown were employed six months after graduation. The statewide average was 72%.
